Re: BOE Request to Block Alleyway for Election Pedestrian Traffic

To the attention of the Athens County Commissioners,

I have been asked to consider the request presented to your board from the Board of Elections (BOE). The request was to close the alley between the BOE and the Athens County Common Pleas Courthouse between the dates of October 8, 2024, and November 5, 2024. Voting community members would be directed to this area to be held until such time as they were called to vote.

Ohio Revised Code Section 5589.01 states: "No person shall obstruct or encumber by fences, buildings, structures, or otherwise, any public road, street, or alley."

This regulation is justified by several critical reasons, ensuring public safety, accessibility, and efficient use of public spaces:

1. **Emergency Access: Critical to First Responders:** Unobstructed alleys are essential for emergency vehicles to access buildings quickly during emergencies. Obstructions can cause delays that may be life-threatening.
2. **Public Safety: Pedestrian and Vehicular Safety:** Obstructions in alleys can create hazards for both pedestrians and vehicles, increasing the risk of accidents and injuries. Clear alleys ensure safe passage for all.
3. **Accessibility and Convenience: Government Services Access:** Many residents, community members and employees rely on this alley for access to parking and a secondary entrance. Obstructions can disrupt daily activities and causing inconvenience.
4. **Traffic Flow and Congestion: Relief from Main Roads:** Alleys help to alleviate traffic congestion on main roads by providing alternate routes for local traffic, deliveries, and service vehicles. Obstructing the alley may push more traffic onto primary roads, exacerbating congestion.

Ohio Revised Code Section 5589.01 is justified by the need to maintain public safety, ensure accessibility for essential services, and support efficient traffic flow. These regulations help to create safer, more functional, and more pleasant environment for all residents, county employees, and businesses.

We are writing in support of the Federal Valley Resource Center's (FVRC) application to ARC Area Development Grant.

As a long-term residents of Athens County and the County Commissioners, we are well aware of the hardships citizens of rural Appalachia face. These hardships were exacerbated by the effects of Covid. In response to these realities, members of FVRC create and execute accessible, essential, services for our rural residents in a traditional Appalachian grassroots fashion. They have networked to provide resources that expand access to health wellness service, workforce development training, and cultural heritage arts. This has been actualized by working with other community organizations such as Community Foods Initiatives, SEOH Food Bank & Kitchen, OU's Heritage College of Osteopathic Medicine, and Federal Hocking Local Schools to creatively spread resources throughout our region and serve multiple SEOH's counties.

Our small rural communities need a resurgence of pride and encouragement to preserve their histories and to create new and innovative ideas; they cannot do so without first being sure that their basic needs are met. FVRC recognizes this and provides needed services such as the food pantry, workforce development programming and the thrift store while simultaneously offering classes in traditional Appalachian folk skills, art and music and building mentorship relationships with Federal Hocking High School Students.

Members of FVRC have shared their vision of renovating the campus to be multi-functional, serving as an Appalachian traditional folk art and folk skills school, attracting locals and tourists alike, as well as serving as a business incubator hub. They envision doing this while maintaining and expanding upon their current programs and services, such as renovating classroom to be hands-on workforce training labs. FVRC is offering long term solutions to systemic problems that have plagued Appalachia for too long and deserves funding to renovate their buildings in order to further actualize these goals

It is essential that Appalachia protect relics of our community, like FVRC's historical buildings. It is of even more urgency and importance that we do so while they remain in use to serve, support and uplift our underserved rural communities in the ways the Federal Valley Resource Center is.

We fully encourage you to consider funding FVRC to make renovations to their buildings, so that they may better serve the rural communities of SEOH.

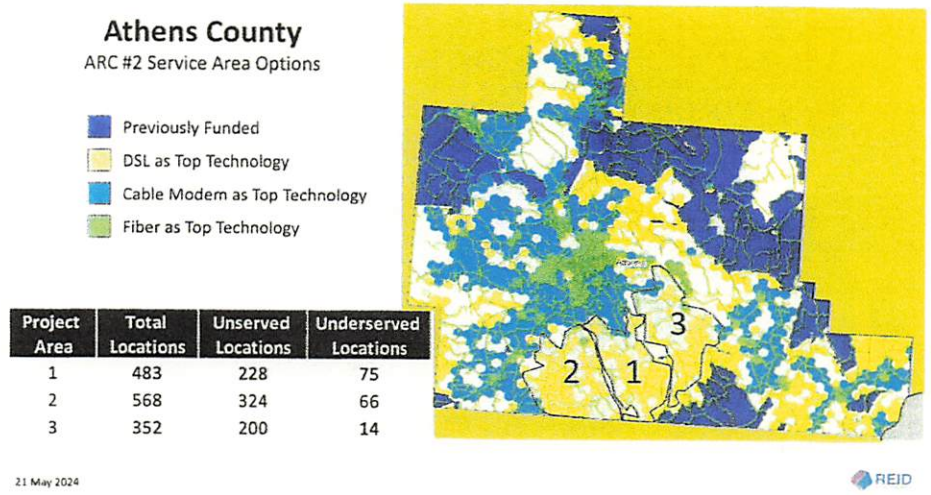

To Buckeye Hills Regional Council,

Please accept this letter in support of Hocking, Athens, Perry Community Action Agency's (HAPCAP) request for Appalachian Regional Council's (ARC) Area Development Funding. If awarded, these funds will be utilized to support the development of an emergency shelter, to support individuals and families in Athens and the surrounding area who are housing insecure. As County Commissioners for Athens County, we believe that this funding is necessary to keep our community safe and healthy, and to demonstrate our commitment to families and children. Athens County is consistently ranked among the poorest counties in the state, and a lack of affordable housing, too few living wage jobs, and inadequate transportation have resulted in a growing number of unhoused individuals. The housing challenges in the County, including a deteriorating older housing stock, a lack of affordable non-student rental options, and rising demand are creating a crisis for many low-income people. Currently, we have too few resources to meet the need, and without an emergency shelter, people who are unhoused often have nowhere to go.

Through this funding, HAPCAP will have the ability to create a safe and supportive space for individuals to access basic needs and supportive services, and to stabilize their lives. This has the potential to create positive change across our community, by promoting community safety and the growth of our local economy.

<i>This outline as written or revised becomes an official operating guideline on the effective date noted above. This guideline supersedes all previous guidelines that relate to this subject.</i>		

The Athens County Personnel Manual shall serve as the primary source of information for all county employees. This guideline is intended to clarify issues pertinent to full-time field employees at Athens County EMS that are not addressed in the Athens County Personnel Manual.

Shift

Full-time employees at Athens County EMS work 24 hour shifts on a three platoon (24 hours on duty, 48 hours off duty) system. The platoons are identified as 1 Unit, 2 Unit, and 3 Unit and correlate to the Central Ohio Fire and Emergency Services work calendar. This calendar includes a leap year rotation. On February 29th, the full-time work schedule will be divided into three 8-hour shifts. This rotation is designed to prevent any unit day from working major holidays two years in a row.

Shift Change

Shift change for full-time employees is at 8:00 am. Employees are encouraged to arrive early for their shift. In the event of an ambulance call at or near shift change, the oncoming crew can respond, alleviating unnecessary overtime and reducing employee fatigue that is created by having the off-going crew handle the call. Employees who arrive after 8:05 am are considered tardy and may be subject to discipline.

Vacation Time Schedule

All full-time employees shall submit vacation requests on a quarterly basis. The dates will follow the schedule established for part time employee bids:

- Requests due December 1st – for January through March
- Requests due March 1st – for April through June
- Requests due June 1st – for July through September
- Requests due September 1st – for October through December

Employees may file for an annual vacation in the next calendar year by submitting their bid(s) on or before November 15th.

Full time employees are capped at three years of accumulated annual vacation time. For example, if an employee earns two weeks of vacation a year, they may carry over a maximum of six weeks of vacation, and in this example all vacation time more than six weeks would need to be used during the calendar year.

Employees who do not request sufficient vacation time will be assigned vacation days. The dates assigned will be shifts where a floater is available and is riding as a 3rd person.

Short notice vacation requests are strongly discouraged. All short notice vacation requests require a fourteen (14) day notice.

If vacation time needs to be cancelled it should be done as soon as feasibly possible.

Trading shifts with Floaters

Employees who trade shifts with a floater become the floater for that day. This is an issue if the floater is assigned as a 3rd person and a call off occurs. The employee who traded the shift with the floater may be reassigned to another station to cover the call off.

Temporary Transfer

Full time employees are subject to temporary transfer when staffing issues arise. We are a county EMS agency, and all employees are expected to work at any station to cover open time if there is a scheduling issue.

A temporary transfer will occur when a 24-hour shift cannot be covered by floaters or in straight time by part time employees. The supervisors have the option of moving a full-time employee to another station and then backfilling the opening created by the temporary transfer. If a full time employee is moved stations during their shift they can be moved to the bottom of the mandation list and they are eligible to submit a mileage reimbursement form. If a non floater employee is moved stations before the beginning

Responsibilities

Full time employees (FTEs) are considered our core operating staff. Supervisors are encouraged to assign station tasks and extra responsibilities to all full-time employees. The normal day to day workload at the EMS stations require delegation of responsibilities with the supervisor acting as the manager of all ongoing projects. These extra responsibilities are considered part of the job in the "other duties as assigned" category.

Number of employees off

No more than two (2) full-time employees will be granted scheduled time off on any given calendar day.

If an employee requests time off and there are already two (2) employees on approved leave, the request shall be denied unless the supervisor determines the leave can be granted without jeopardizing the operational status of Athens County EMS. This exception shall also require the approval of the Chief or Assistant Chief.

Time off requests for Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, New Year's Eve and New Year's Day shall only be granted if the floaters are available to cover those requests.

Employees who want time off and did not receive floater coverage may cover their own shifts with any non-overtime employee. The shifts must be filled and approved by the Chief or Assistant Chief at least ten (10) calendar days before the holiday occurs.

If the shift cannot be covered, the employee is expected to report to work.

Full-time employees shall not be mandated to cover employees who request time off if the floaters are unavailable.

Calling off for a holiday when you are not ill or injured is subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination.

Class III Special Event staffing

Class III Special Events are large scale events that require significant staffing levels to provide an acceptable level of emergency medical service. Full time employees are subject to mandation on any or all Class III events as a condition of employment.

All time off requests on the day of a Class III special event as well as the day before and the day after the event will need to be approved by the Chief or Assistant Chief.

of their shift they can be moved to the bottom of the mandation list.

EXAMPLES:

- ATHENS STATION 51 – 3 paramedics, 1 EMT scheduled
- COOLVILLE STATION 52 – 1 paramedic, 1 EMT scheduled
- The Coolville paramedic is on extended injury leave.
- Floaters and part-time paramedics cannot cover the open shift.
- One fulltime paramedic is moved from Athens to Coolville.
- The opening at Athens is covered by part-time EMTs

Temporary transfers will only occur within the unit day. If you are assigned to 2 Unit, you will only be transferred to other assignments on a 2 Unit workday. This does not apply to floaters. Moving an employee to another station will occur only when necessary and may be accomplished by an advance notice temporary transfer or by forced overtime.

Athens County EMS also reserves the right to temporarily transfer a full-time employee to another duty station if there are problems or issues in the workplace that cannot be resolved in a less intrusive manner. In some cases, this may involve a change in duty shifts. These temporary transfers may be long term (greater than 30 days) but will not be considered disciplinary in nature.

Athens County EMS will honor home station assignments as much as possible, but the operational needs of the agency will supersede an employee's desire to work at a particular post or duty station.

Shift and Station Reassignment Requests

Full-Time employees may request shift reassignment if the following conditions are met:

- Employee requests for a shift or station reassignment will be only performed when there is equal ranking, i.e., Paramedic for Paramedic, EMT for EMT.
- The request must be made in writing and submitted to the station supervisor.
- If two full-time employees are requesting a shift trade within the station, both employees shall sign the written request.
- If two full-time employees are requesting to trade stations, the written request shall be signed by both employees and sent to both station supervisors for approval.
- Shift reassignments are approved and implemented by the station supervisors.
- Station reassignments also require approval from the Chief.
- Reassignment requests are a courtesy. Athens County EMS is under no mandatory obligation to approve or honor these requests.

Forced Overtime

Athens County EMS is obligated to fully staff our ambulances 24 hours a day. All full-time employees are subject to forced overtime (a.k.a. "mandations") in the event a staffing vacancy occurs that cannot be filled in straight time or voluntary overtime, or for large events that require extraordinary EMS staffing levels.

A **Forced Overtime List** of all full-time employees shall be securely maintained along with the employer's certification level and the last date of mandation. When it is necessary to mandate an employee to work, the supervisor shall follow this procedure:

1. Arrange any temporary transfers (if available) that may be used to cover the Paramedic part of the shift.
2. Obtain the current Forced Overtime list.
3. Locate an on-duty employee that has the most distant incident of forced overtime.
4. In the event a Paramedic is needed to cover the open time, a full-time EMT will be bypassed on the forced overtime list.
5. In the event an EMT is needed to cover the open time, a full-time Paramedic will be bypassed on the forced overtime list.
6. Identify the correct employee and contact them at the station.
7. Mandations may be for no more than twelve (12) hours.
8. After the mandation has been made, update the forced overtime list. The mandated employee(s) will be moved to the bottom of the list.

Once mandated, an employee may voluntarily trade or give away their forced overtime to another employee pending approval from a supervisor. The employee who works the forced overtime will get credit for working the mandation.

If a full-time employee works 2 overtime shifts in a 28-day window, if a full-time employee works 24 hours of unscheduled overtime in a 28-day window, that employee can be moved to the bottom of the mandation list. This includes special event coverage. It is the employee's responsibility to report the work hours to the central scheduling officer and request the mandation list update.

A refusal to work forced overtime or any attempt to be deceptive (claiming illness after being mandated, etc.) will be investigated and may subject the employee to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

Supervisors may volunteer for overtime but are not mandated to forced overtime.

The probationary period for all employees shall be one calendar year from the date of hire or promotion. Internal promotions may have the probationary period reduced to six months after evaluation.

Probationary employees are permitted to apply for and be awarded other jobs.




